Leukonychia Totalis

SUMMARY

Leukonychia totalis is a rare clinical disorder where all the finger and toe nails appear strikingly white. We report one case in a young male with no apparent cause. To our knowledge this is the first case reported in the Sultanate of Oman.

Case Report History:

A 21-year-old male patient of normal built, complained of white discoloration of all finger and toe nails of four years duration. The patient was first seen in late 1990.

The condition, which is asymptomatic, started four years back by involving the left middle and ring fingers. In two to three months time, all the finger and toe nails turned white. There was no past history of a similar illness, and none of his family members or relatives are similarly affected. Further, there was no history of any chronic infection or systemic disturbances.

Examination:

Examination of all fingers and toe nails revealed a uniformly affected strikingly white nails (Fig. 1). Otherwise, these nails showed no abnormalities. Clinical examination of all body organs revealed normal findings.

Investigations:

Routine blood count, blood chemistry including liver and renal profiles, fasting blood sugar, urine, and stool, all showed normal findings

Treatment and follow up:

Besides reassurance, the patient was given a placebo. He has been regularly followed up and was seen last in December 1993. All his nails remained white in colour and he was in a good health.

Discussion

Leukonychia totalis might be due to a) an autosomal dominant disorder, b) secondary to severe systemic illness.¹ No obvious cause could be found in the case reported here. Incomplete keratinisation or presence of air spaces in the nail plate is believed to be the cause of white discoloration,² but there is no concrete evidence for that. To our knowledge this is the first case reported in the Sultanate of Oman.

Manuscripts

- Should be addressed to the Editor, PO Box 17296 Khaldeyah 72453, Kuwait.
- Two copies of all elements of the paper are requested.
- All the matter should be typed, double-spaced with wide margins, on one side of each sheet only.
- The paper should have the following arrangement: 1. Title page; 2. Abstracts; 3. Text; 4. References; 5. Legends; 6. Tables; and 7. Figures. Title page should bear the author(s) name(s), degrees, affiliation(s), and the address to which reprints are to be sent.

Tables and Figures

- Refer to figures as Fig. and give Arabic numeral.
- Submit 2 copies of each photograph and drawing on glossy paper of good quality.
- Use blank ink for charts (line drawings).
- Identify figures on back by author's name and number of figure.
- Start tables at top of new page.

References

- All references in text must be identified by superscript Arabic numerals in the order in which they appear in the manuscript. When referring to a reference, type the last name of the author followed by its reference number. If referring to two authors, use both last names, otherwise type the last name of first author followed by "et al."
- In Reference page, list the references in order of appearance in the manuscript. When referring to a periodical, type last name followed by initials, title of paper, periodical name abbreviated as in the original one, year of publication, volume, pages. Type all authors if 3 or less, otherwise type the first 3 authors followed by "et al.". e.g. Breathnach AS, Wyllie LM. Electron microscopy of melanocytes and melanosomes in freckled human epidermis. J Invest Dermatol 1964;42:389-394.

When referring to books, type name of author(s) (as above), title, edition, place, publisher, year, page referring to. e.g. Mckusick VA. Mendelian inheritance in man. 7th ed. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins University, 1986:1228.

If the book has contributors, type the name of author(s), title, in: editors, title of book, place, publisher, year, page referred to. e.g. Vickers CF. Topical corticosteroids. In: Fitzpatrick TB, Eisen AZ, Wolff k, et al. eds. Dermatology in general medicine. New York: McGraw-Hill, 1987: 2540-2545.
